

DID YOU KNOW?

One of the most remarkable coincidences in history is an 1898 novel by Morgan Robertson that "foretold" the sinking of the 'Titanic' 14 years before the disaster occurred.

There is astonishing similarity between Robertson's fictional ship and the real 'Titanic'. In the novel, Robertson describes his ship as having a displacement of 70 000 tons; the 'Titanic's' displacement was only 4000 tons less. The two ships had similar passenger capacities (about 3000), top speed (25 knots), length (800 feet vs. 882.5 feet) and they shared numberous other features, including the lack of a sufficient number of life-boats.

In the novel, Robertson's ship, which has a passenger list filled with wealthy and powerful people, is on its maiden voyage which it strikes an iceberg in the North Atlantic on an April night and sinks.

The 'Titanic', which was also on its maiden voyage, struck an iceberg in the North Atlantic on the night of April 12th, 1912, and sank, carrying some of the most prominent people in the world to their deaths.

The name of Robertson's fictional ship? 'The Titan'.


